Lehr Miller was the organizer of the Lummi Island Community Club(LICC) and started the newsletter. The first issue of the "Lummi Island Newsletter" was mailed to all community club members in May, 1966, It was typed on one side of 8 ½ x 11" paper. The publication schedule was very erratic that first year.

The early newsletters were "people-centric" reporting on the comings and goings of the Islanders- births, marriages, illnesses, and travels. During the late sixties and early seventies there was a paragraph in each issue reporting on those folks who had medical issues (with details) severe enough to require surgery and/or hospitalization. There was also a monthly update on the whereabouts of the Island "boys" who were in military service. Miller, the editor of these early issues wrote without constraint and often used satiric misspelling of words for effect.


The newsletter continued to expand as the Island became busier - becoming the preferred method of reporting the "happenings" and activities of the numerous Island organizations, the school, the fire dept., the post office, and the library. Also, it was a good place to advertise your business. During the 80's historian Peggy Aiston kept all aware of Island history by letting us know what had happened that month in previous years. Articles on Island history were continued by Beth Hudson and later Paul Davis. Obituaries have always had an honored and preferential space in the newsletter. Unused space was filled-in with cartoons, jokes or silly stories. It expanded to two sheets in '68, then 3 in '83. By May, '87 four sheets were required.

The newsletter has had many names. Most often it was labeled some version of "Lummi Island Community Club Newsletter", but editor Paul Davis, looking for a more creative name, came up with "the LI Monthly Bird Cage Liner", "The Rag", "Lilliputian Press", "The Lummi Island Casette", "Lummi Island News and World Report", "Lummi Island APauling Newsletter", to name a few. In 2000, editor Davis felt the "use of 'Newsletter' as a proper noun for the name of our monthly epistle lacked the class and dignity that we richly deserved" and decided our newsletter would henceforth be known as the "TOME of Lummi Island".

The tools used to produce the newsletter have evolved with the times. First entirely typed on a manual typewriter and printed by mineograph, later separate typed articles were submitted and pasted in place by the editor, then came the word processor. When Paul was editor, his "cut and paste" technique was so precise that it was unnoticed by the reader. This mock-up was first delivered to be photocopied then later to be printed. In 2021 Paul started to electronically deliver the TOME file to the printers – and the "eTOME" was born and delivered to anyone requesting it via email. Folding the TOME is still done manually by Island volunteers with 734 delivered by the post office and over 290 by email.

The main editors of the newsletter were Lehr Miller from 1966-1976 (Miller was assisted by Gus Johnson), Gerri Neuman '76 until May, '81. Paul Davis took charge as editor in Jun of '81 until Dec, 2022. Followed by Christine Green, Kris Sager, and currently Janice Holmes. Prior to computers, the editors were assisted by a number of typists: Shirley Aiston, Paula Gaines, Larry Van Dyke, Carol Stoufer and Terry Bedsworth.

A celebration of the TOME's Anniversary will be in August at the Grange. Details to follow.



Long Time Editor Paul Davis. Hard at work editing the Tome






Presidents Corner



The coming 12 months mark a crucial phase in implementing our Board-approved Action Plan, shaped through nearly a year of planning and collaboration with residents, formal island groups, and regional partners. These are the key tasks:

- **1. Leadership Onboarding**: Hire and onboard a Program Coordinator to lead project implementation.
- 2. Launch the Telehealth Resource Center:
 Equip the Center's physical space. Recruit and train Telehealth Resource Center guides.
 Develop policies, operating procedures, and ongoing volunteer support systems. Promote services through an open house and community outreach. Build internal "train-the-trainer" capacity based on initial training in PeaceHealth-led sessions.
- 3. Implement Wellness Classes and Activities: Continue recruiting and supporting instructors, implement an online scheduling system, and supply needed equipment to sustain diverse wellness offerings.
- 4. Activate Health & Wellness Advocates:
 Recruit qualified Advocates and collaborate with trainer to develop a curriculum with supportive policies and guidelines. Promote the advocate program and connect trained advocates with residents.



- **6. Grow In-Home Support Services:** Create directories of in-home care providers, contractors, and volunteers. Identify and launch feasible home modification projects. Assess additional unmet needs.
- 7. Deepen Partner Collaboration: Launch programs with partners such as PeaceHealth (telehealth technology resources and training), the Heritage Trust (guided nature programs), Health Ministries Network (Ask-A-Nurse), NW Regional Council (senior services), and the Fire Department (home safety checks, vaccinations).
- **8. Communications Infrastructure:** Redesign our website into a comprehensive information hub. Develop tools and vehicles for online scheduling, program promotion, and resident engagement.
- **9. Systems to Capture Outcomes:** Implement sign-ins, service tracking, program volumes, assessment of new and unmet needs, and feedback mechanisms including surveys.

These coordinated efforts will drive measurable improvements in resident access to care, wellness engagement, and social connection, while strengthening systems for long-term impact.




Whatcom Ferry Advisory Committee


Lummi Island Artists' Studio Tour

Harold Long's Beach Store The Beach Store was a magical place. It was more an Emporium than a store. It carried just about anything an islander could want, and if it didn't, Harold would pick it up the next day when he went in on a supply run. On the north side of the store, behind a wall, was the hardware section. He had barrels of nails, metal stove pipe sections, rolled roofing, buckets of roofing tar, screws, bolts, and a wide selection of plumbing parts.

On the south side of the store, was a long counter, going the full length of the room. On it was the cash register, the big ledger book that folks charged things on, a big wheel of cheddar cheese under a big clear dome, with a cutting blade to cut off whatever size chunk you needed. He also kept a huge slab of smoked bacon, and he had a slicing machine, so could slice whatever thickness you wanted.

In front of the counter was a long low magazine rack, where one could get the latest Movie, Detective, Auto, or Sports magazines. Stacked in front of the Magazines, were usually boxes of fresh fruit, such as apples, grapes, oranges, or selected vegetables, like potatoes, onions, etc.

Across the aisle from the counter, was a selection of every conceivable candy a child could imagine. There was also an ice cream freezer, with fudgsicles, popsicles, and Dixie Cups, with flat wooden spoons.

There was a big cooler with soda pop, like Nehi Orange, Dad's Root Beer, or Coca Cola. Behind the counter, on shelves that went clear to the ceiling, were rows and rows of canned goods, and boxes of breakfast cereals. Harold had a long pole with a grasping mechanism on the end, and he could quickly grab whatever product you asked for from the shelves behind him.

When Harold was awaiting customers, he liked to stand in front of the window, that was behind the gas pumps outside, with one foot on the window sill, and watch the cars go by, and the ferry going back and forth. He also enjoyed imbibing in a bit of liquor in the afternoons. On a few occasions, he could make an error on the ledger book, and islanders gave him the affectionate nickname "Shifty", and carefully monitored their charges, but he was loved by one and all.



The First Issue: May 25, 1966

Due to the extreme urgency of a Park Department decision prior to the approaching deadline established for the use of allocated federal funds it has become necessary to exert immediate and concentrated effort along this line by the Lummi Island Community Club. Therefore the activities of the Club will be directed towards a more comprehensive understanding of the entire situation for the next few weeks. The Club's Board of Directors are attempting to secure representatives from all the agencies that have to do with the establishment of Parks, from the State level to the local level, to meet with the Club at our next meeting. We hope to thoroughly explore the plans and possibilities of Island Parks through an informative exchange of ideas from all those concerned. We have had favorable responses from the State Park director, his planners and property men; the Bureau of Natural Resources; The County Planning Director; the County Park Commission and the County Park Director. We also hope to secure the State Land Commissioner's cooperation. Our intention is to conduct a Jeep tour of the Island in the early afternoon for all the representatives - hitting all the possible park locations. We will then meet with the Club membership around 6:30 P.M. for a planned pot luck dinner at the willows, after which a general discussion will follow. We will need help from those familiar with the geography of the Island also those who have suitable rough-land vehicles. We have established June 1st as the best possible date for this meeting.

A reliable source has informed us that our local mailman has been asked by the postal authorities to move to Bellingham and operate out of that office, which would mean doubling his route and pay. The same source declared that there was no intention of eventually closing the local post office but rather it would be more accurate to assume that at the retirement of the local postmaster the post office site and facilities would be put on a contract basis here on the Island.


Recent information has brought to light the very real possibility of a dangerous water pollution situation developing from the activities of the Intalco Plant. Apparently there s some question about the permit issued them by the Pollution Control Board as it seems to be in excess of a concentration allowable to maintain marine life It is our understanding that the company is attempting to quiet the objections of various marine biologists by extending the discharge pipe further out into the straits. Should a killing pollution develop in this body of water, Lummi Island and the salmon runs would feel the full economic and disastrous impact.


