

Following graduation, he was commissioned as a First Lieutenant in the Transportation Corps of the United States Army. He served with distinction for 15 years, ultimately leaving the Army at the rank of Captain.

After his military service, Jonathan built a successful career in the plastics industry, working closely with doctors and hospitals. His work reflected his lifelong dedication to innovation, service, and the protection of others.

Jonathan was deeply committed to the Lummi Island Congregational Church and the Lummi Island Heritage Trust. He dedicated much of his time to raising funds for the trust and organizing the Annual Lummi Island Rummage Sale. He also loved being involved in his community—volunteering at the local school, reading to children, helping with various projects, and serving with the Lummi Island Fire Department. Additionally, he was a member of the Coast Guard Auxiliary, further reflecting his lifelong spirit of service.

He loved participating in the Ski to Sea event from Mt. Baker to Bellingham Bay. Jonathan was passionate about organizing many ski events, beach parties, tennis clubs and holiday gatherings for family, friends, and the community throughout his years in Rochester, NY, Ridgefield, CT, and Lummi Island, WA.

Jonathan had a great love for all his dogs and was passionate about teaching many of them to hunt pheasant. He also loved hiking on the trails of Lummi with his dogs Windy and Bear.

He is survived by his loving wife of 57 years, Elizabeth E. Fincke, his daughter, son, and several grandchildren. Jonathan will be remembered for his creativity, dedication, warmth, and his unwavering commitment to both his family and his community.

A funeral will be held in Grand Isle, Vermont, at the Grand Isle Family Cemetery in August. In lieu of flowers, donations may be made to the Lummi Island Heritage Trust or K9s for Warriors.

Jonathan's memory will live on in the hearts of all who knew and loved him.



Elizabeth Love Fincke: passed away on May 18, 2025, in San Antonio, Texas, at the age of 84. She was born on November 20, 1940, in Grand Rapids, Michigan.

Elizabeth was a graduate of the Northfield School for Girls in Mount Hermon, Massachusetts, and earned a nursing degree from the University of Rochester. We will honor this milestone and all of LIHT's incredible supporters at this year's Forest Fest — our annual summer BBQ bash — held in the Otto meadow on July 12th, from 12 to 3pm. Please join us for music that will move your feet by The Atlantics, delicious grilled fare, and local craft brews. We'll also be hosting our famous Pie Auction with talented island bakers competing to bake the pie that fetches the highest bid! You will find the Pie Entry form on our website. Fun for the whole family awaits!

On July 25th, we dive into the wonderful world of seaweed with Jennifer Hahn, Bellingham's own author, scientist, teacher, culinary explorer, and wilderness guide. We'll start the day at 9:30am with an exploration of a Lummi Island beach for seaweed identification followed by cooking demos and sampling. In the evening at 6pm, please join us at The Gathering Place to enjoy a lively slideshow lecture — *Pacific Harvest: Foraging as a Healing Passport to Place, Plants, Animals, and Nature* — on the cultural, culinary and ecological uses of sea veggies, land plants, marine shellfish and mushrooms. Jennifer will share stories of her 40 years foraging afoot and afloat from Alaska to California, including animals who shelter in and eat the foods we also love, sustainable foraging tips, nutrition, recipe ideas, and profiles from Indigenous traditional food experts working to revitalize Traditional Foodways in the Salish Sea and beyond. Jennifer's presentation will be followed by a Q&A and book signing and accompanied by popcorn "SEA-soned" with local farmed kelp (Lummi Island SeaGreens). Registration is required for both events via the LIHT website.

Nature Explores will be held again this August! On three Wednesdays (6th, 13th & 20th) The Lummi Island Heritage Trust presents a program created just for kids 6-12 years old. Led by Micha Camarillo, this fun, environmental education program teaches children about the wild and natural treasures of the island. Each session is 2.5 hours long, 9:30am-12 noon. In celebration of seaweed, we are delighted to witness a resurgence of bull kelp off the shore of the Aiston Quarry. Bull



kelp forests are vital to the Salish Sea ecosystem, acting as underwater forests that support an incredible diversity of marine life. These dense beds of brown macroalgae provide essential habitat and food resources for a wide array of species, including migrating salmonids and are an important hunting ground for our transient whales. Beyond supporting biodiversity, bull kelp offers valuable ecosystem services: it combats ocean acidification by absorbing carbon dioxide, protects shorelines by reducing wave energy, and provides crucial nutrients and shelter throughout its life cycle. The presence of healthy bull kelp forests is increasingly important for mitigating the effects of climate change and preserving the overall health and productivity of the Salish Sea.

Library Levy

Library Levy Proposition 2025-02 - Restore the Library Levy Rate To 0.42/\$1000

Whatcom County Library System (WCLS) is asking voters to consider a measure (Proposition 2025-02) on the Aug. 5, 2025, ballot to restore the property tax levy rate that funds operations and services. The library system is asking now in response to increased costs and demand for services. The measure would restore the property tax levy rate that funds daily operations and maintenance of its libraries to \$0.42 per \$1,000 assessed value.

- WCLS last asked voters to approve a levy lid lift in 2009. At that time, voters approved a rate of \$0.44 per thousand dollars of assessed value.
- Over the past 16 years, WCLS's levy rate has effectively fallen to \$0.26/\$1,000.,due to inflation.*
- Since then, the number of people we serve and operating costs have significantly increased, and the library system's annual expenses now exceed annual revenues causing a drain on reserves.
- If the levy is restored, the library system will be able to maintain current levels of staffing, open hours and services and continue supporting a robust collection of library materials, including physical and digital items, with minimal wait times and online/streaming resources
- If the levy rate is not restored, the library system will need to cut staff, reduce open hours and eliminate services. This may include closing branches one or two days a week and reducing its investment in library materials, with increased wait times and decreased selection.

* By law, taxing districts may only increase their levies by up to 1% each year. A property valued at \$600,000 that paid \$156 to WCLS in year one would pay \$157.56 in year 2, an increase of \$1.56 to WCLS. Your tax liabilities increase when voters approve a NEW levy (say, a school district capital projects levy, or the jail levy) or when voters approve the formation of an entirely new taxing district (such as a new Park District). So, your "extra" taxes go to the new taxing districts or new levies, with only the 1% annual increase allowed by law going to WCLS. For additional information, go to WCLS.ORG/levy.

Lummi Island Health & Wellness (LIH&W) Program

Since Our Health & Wellness Program launch is gathering steam as new funding support arrives and classes are poised to commence in early July!

New Grant Funding – The Civic Club, having completed a very successful Annual Plant Sale Event, made a grant of \$2,000 to serve as bridge funding for our Program Coordinator position. Yay to this treasure of an Island organization supporting our mission of helping us all age in place successfully!

These funds along with an earlier grant from the Mt. Baker Foundation will carry us through the summer when a larger grant is expected from the North Sound Accountable Communities for Health (NSACH) organization. The preliminary report from NSACH is that we will receive the majority of the amount we requested. This major grant will provide full funding for our Program Coordinator as well as for a Communications Specialist.

We feel very pleased to have now received 6 of the 7 grants we requested over the past 6 months amounting to about \$125,000, enough resources to advance our Action Plans including some of the programs listed below.

Telehealth is here - Any Islander who would like support to communicate with medical providers on-line should contact the Health and Wellness Program. This includes helping Islanders get set up on their own computer, or making the Telehealth Center at the Gathering Place available. In addition to having a private room with the necessary computer equipment, telehealth volunteers can assist in recording weight, pulse rate, oxygen saturation, and blood pressure readings. 
Home Modifications for Safety Program – Using a \$2,500 grant from AARP to set up workshops for Islanders on home modifications for safety purposes, we will be offering workshops later this summer and fall providing samples of safety equipment and engaging volunteers to help install items.

Grange Hall Improvements, both happening now and on the horizon:

Audio/Visual upgrades: Thanks to a lovely grant from LICA and some "masterminding" by Alan, we have purchased all the components for ceiling mounted cameras and speakers in the main hall and exterior speakers outdoors in multiple places. We'll do our best to work around the rental schedule to minimize inconvenience for our renters.

Parade: Due to schedule complications on the part of our volunteers, the Grange won't be having a parade this Summer. If anyone out there wants to take on the job of organizing a parade, go for it! If not, we'll take this up again next Summer.

Confusion Reigned - Purse Seiners vs Reef Netters Several articles from the Bellingham Herald tell a story of conflict between reef net and purse seiner fishermen that took place off the west shore of Lummi Island on Sept. 7, 1937. Captain Henning Woog of the purse seiner Alma out of Seattle brought complaint against Lummi Island reef netters for cutting his nets. Although he didn't know their names, Capt. Woog was just sure they'd done it. Sheriff T.W. Farmer went to Lummi Island with 20 arrest warrants for said unidentified criminals

Leaders assured the sheriff that they would appear in court on Sept. 10th and they did indeed arrive – 45 reef netters came willing to submit to arrest! Sheriff Farmer asked for 20 names. The reef netters' lawyer responded "You pick them out." No one would own up to cutting the nets. Nope, they had no idea who did it, so the sheriff randomly selected 20 men and added another 5 for good measure. Their names and identifying information were entered into the Whatcom County Jail Records; committed and released on the same date. Some of the names we recognize as islanders are: Austin, Corcoran, Smith, and Tuttle. The whole crowd trooped down the hall to Judge Boone Hardin's court. After accusations and denials were bantered back & forth a hearing was scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 18th and the sheriff's office ordered to conduct an investigation.

Who were the real culprits?

A week later the sheriff & his officers were still in the dark about the identity of the men who actually cut the nets. "John Does" and "Richard Roes" from both the reservation and the island were keeping a low profile. Captain Woog was the only person who showed up for the arraignment before Judge Hardin on the 18th. Woog could only suggest names of two accused men who could have 'perhaps' been involved. By this point, Judge Hardin wasn't having any more and informed the captain that he was responsible for bringing names before the court. Captain Woog vowed that he would hire a lawyer and be back. But, that's the last we heard about the case of the unknown reef net 'criminals' in 1937.

Resilient Lummi Happenings

Resilient Lummi is currently focused on raising awareness and raising our voices to tell our legislators to oppose climate cuts in the Big Budget Bill. The bill would cut funds for climate projects that have already been passed, and are in the works in many locations, including: clean tech projects, electric car rebates, agriculture resilience, and clean energy infrastructure that brings jobs. We can't afford to go backwards. There is also great concern about the REQUIRED sell-off of Public Lands in Whatcom County included in the Budget Bill. You may have seen our table at the Saturday Market offering pre- addressed, stamped postcards for constituents to send to our Senators and Congressman. Please contact your lawmakers if you are concerned about what the Big Budget Bill might mean to us all if passed. Write for Climate Change, right?

At Resilient Lummi we've been discussing the day-to-day details of keeping more trash out of landfills, specifically plastics of all sorts. We've compiled a list of various ways to give unwanted plastics to businesses that send it to recycling facilities. Fred Myer, Haggen, Kohls, Safeway, and WinCo all recycle plastic film (if you can stretch it it's plastic film) for free. They send it to NexTrex to be transformed into decking etc. Visit NexTrex.com for more details.

- · You can always ask your local stores if they recycle what they sell.
- SSC has an updated website detailing what can be recycled. They will charge you \$7 for a huge bag of plastic film (which can include clean, empty potting soil and compost bags) if you bring it to the depot on Roeder Ave.
- Ridwell Express will sell you a subscription service (which can be shared with neighbors) which includes prepaid envelopes to send plastics of all kinds back to them for responsible recycling (think Kind bar wrappers, dog treat bags, prescription bottles, plastic lids). See <u>RidwellExpress.com</u> for more details.

Another business in Whatcom County that helps reduce waste is the Living Pantry. Their vision is that every household in Whatcom County reduces plastic and other harmful product consumption by choosing clean, local, refillable products that support a healthy circular economy. They have 2 locations - in Bellingham at 2420 James St (beside Trader Joe) and in Blaine at 264 H St. Along these lines is a new business called Pumped Goods at 112 Ohio St. in Bellingham. See pumpedgoods.com for details. These businesses deserve our support and help make it easier to transition away from a wasteful, polluting consumer lifestyle.

Do you have leftover medications you don't know what to do with? Our Island Library offers a free, safe way to dispose of unused medications to avoid the contamination of our water and soil from leaching pharmaceuticals. Ask our friendly librarians for the medication envelopes that send these potent materials to a responsible end-of-life.

Summer on Lummi is a favorite time for large celebrations and if you're planning a big event please consider contacting SSC, Sustainable Connections / Toward Zero Waste to arrange for FoodPlus recycling for all that leftover food and paper plates, etc. Food waste in the landfill is a large source of methane, a nasty greenhouse gas.

At our last meeting we discussed offering a Seed Saving presentation in late summer, doing another movie night in the fall and setting up dedicated aluminum can receptacles at local businesses (to be donated to the Dolly Parton can recycling project at the Grange). If you are interested in seeing these events happen, consider joining us at our next meeting on July 15 at 6:30 in the Hanson Room of the Island Library.



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To all of you in the island community who have so generously donated money to support the second teacher position at Beach School next year, we thank you. I hope you know how important this effort has been; our island school is a huge part of this community. Beautiful Beach


Beach school is a place that brings an unknown happiness, a place that seems normal but when you're about to leave you see how priceless the happiness here can be.

Construction is underway at the fire station on the bathroom upgrade project and should be completed by the time you're reading this.

Please take this opportunity to mark your calendars for this year's open house. It will be on Sunday, August 17th from 10 AM to 2 PM at the fire station. I anticipate a big turnout and I am excited to see you all there.

Burn Ban for Lummi Island Announced June 15th!. Restrictions on open burning now in effect. Recreational fires are still allowed with the landowner's permission. Recreational fires must meet the following requirements:

- Recreational fires no larger than 3x3' in diameter are allowed using ONLY seasoned firewood or charcoal.
- Winds must be LESS than 7 MPH.
- A charged garden hose or 10 gallons of water with a bucket shall be on site.
- Beach fires must be below the last high tide line and **not** in or around driftwood.
- All other locations must be in an approved enclosure.
- Approved enclosures required of cement block, stones or #10 gauge steel, a minimum of 16" high and open on one side. Materials being burned must be lower than the sides.
- All fires must be DEAD OUT (cold to touch) prior to leaving.
- Violations of these burn restrictions can result in response fees starting at \$250.00
- If you have a fire that has to be extinguished by fire agencies, you may be held responsible for all suppression costs.
