#### **Historical Rainfall**


In 1980, Al and Sheila Marshall began collecting daily rainfall data at their farm on Westshore Drive with Susan Hutton and Michael Byers continuing the work over the last couple of years. In 1991, Jerry Brown started keeping data off S. Nugent Road. In 1992, Charles Evans, off Centerview Rd. joined the project, which was later taken over by Nancy Simmerman at her Tuttle Lane home. All of them agreed to use the same type of rain collection device. In the past couple of years, Leslie Dempsey and Scott Josiah have begun keeping records as well.

Data has been digitized and statistical analysis done in order to better understand rainfall trends. Below is a graph showing data through 2024 from four of the rainfall stations averaged together. Black dots indicate each year with the smooth line being the statistical fit to the data. The bottom axis indicates the years from 1980 to 2024 with the vertical axis showing the rainfall in inches.

It is apparent that year to year rainfall on the island has a great deal of variability with the driest years being 1993 (about 25 inches) followed by 1994. The wettest years were 2021 (about 43 inches) and 2024. Over the last decade, the months of May, June, July and August have been trending dryer with the wetter months showing an increase in precipitation.

Rainfall on the island and in the San Juan Islands is often rain-shadowed by the Olympic Mountains. Weather systems that move onshore from the Pacific Ocean cause rain to fall as the system rises over the mountains. The lee side of the mountains, which includes the islands receive far less rain. As the system moves east over the mainland, the air rises over the foothills and drops rain again. Average annual rainfall in Western Washington is as high as 119 inches a year in Forks and about 57 inches in the Deming area of Whatcom County to a low of around 16 inches in Sequim and about 25 inches on San Juan Island.

The islanders who have agreed to collect and record rainfall data do a great service for the community at large by helping all of us to better understand climate trends as we go forward into a warmer world. They are citizen scientists at their best.

Lummi Island Heritage Trust would like to thank those of you who completed a **Trail Usage and Accessibility Survey**. Your responses will help us understand how our preserves and trails are being used and how we can improve your experience. As autumn approaches, the leaves are beginning to turn yet late-season pollinators remain at work, sourcing nectar in late-flowering plants. Native asters persist into fall, such as Douglas Aster and Puget Gumweed. The latter grows in abundance in the coastal habitats of Lummi Island, thriving in and around driftwood, at the edges of the brackish waters of the Legoe Bay slough, and on the precipices of rocky bluffs. Identifiable by its resinous, "gummy" flower buds and conspicuous bright-yellow flowers, gumweed is hardy, deer-resistant, and boasts a long-lasting flowering season — blooming from late spring through fall and, sometimes, into the depths of a

mild winter. It's an excellent plant to include in a low-water, deer-resistant pollinator garden and in wetland and prairie restoration sites.

Please join us for a mindful journey in the forest! On September 28th, LIHT welcomes Lummi Island Health and Wellness to the Otto Preserve to host a Meditative Forest Walk, an immersive experience that blends Forest Bathing (Shinrin-Yoku), Mindful Walking, and intentional Connection with Nature. The collaboration between our island organizations stems from a shared belief in the sanctity of the land and how we can best honor both it and ourselves, celebrating the beauty of the forest and contemplating the bounty that nature provides. Look for details soon on LIHT and LIHW websites and social media channels.

In October, you won't want to miss our annual Mushroom Foray. Mycologist Dr. Fred Rhoades along with esteemed colleagues will guide participants on each of our four preserves in identifying local mushroom species. The Northwest Mushroomers Association has been in partnership with LIHT for many years, hosting this fun and educational experience for all ages. Last month we discussed how some researchers have linked the presence of Nitrogen-15, an isotope that is abundant in the ocean, to the critical role of salmon in supporting our native "salmon forests." Our thanks to a reader — an accomplished scientist — who pointed out that Nitrogen-15 is not exclusive to the ocean but is also naturally occurring in upland habitats. There is no doubt of the critical importance of salmon to our marine, riparian, and forest ecosystems — however, given the terrestrial distribution of Nitrogen-15, its presence in trees is likely not the definining proof of these interrelationships.

Let's Parade! By Leslie Dempsey




It's back on thanks to the organizing efforts of Cassa Cole! The annual end-of-summer sea themed parade will be Saturday, September 6th, 11am.



#### **Resilient Lummi Happenings**

It's not too late for fall planting! There are free seeds in the Seed Library, just in time for a last crop of lettuce or greens, or for planting a cover crop to nourish the soil / cut down on weeds. There are even flower seeds in the Plant Now box. What is the Seed Library? There are over 60 varieties of free seeds to take home, organized by Resilient Lummi, and housed in the Island Library's Hanson Room.

Interested in saving seeds and perhaps sharing them with other islanders? Late summer/fall is an excellent time. Select some of your most successful vegetables and flowers, and let them go to seed, while still on the living plant. You can harvest them by carefully cutting off the stem when the seed pod is dry and brown and turning it upside down in a paper bag, and then letting it dry a few more days in a dry, sunny location. Shake the bag and separate the seeds from the pod, cleaning out the debris as much as possible. Place seeds in a small glass container and label clearly. Putting them in the freezer for a few days cuts down on pests. There is great information in the seed saving book in the Seed Library.

Keep your eyes peeled for a presentation in early Spring on growing and saving seeds.





#### December 24, 1927 - August 5, 2025

Our beloved matriarch, Anne Burnett Rector Jewell, gracefully exited stage left on August 5, 2025...having spent 97.7 years being the star of the show. Born on Christmas Eve 1927 in Aurora, Illinois, Anne arrived just in time to be the best Christmas present her parents, Harold James Rector and Flora Emma Caroline Schultz, ever received. She was the second of six spirited children (five sisters and one brave brother), a lineup that undoubtedly honed her skills in diplomacy, determination, and dishing out sibling justice when needed.

In 1943, the Rector family migrated westward to Washington state, eventually landing in Bellingham, a city Anne would come to leave her mark on in more ways than one. There, at the tender age of fifteen, she met the love of her life, Earle "Bud" David Jewell, at Bellingham High School. A full-ride scholarship to the University of Chicago could not distract her from Bud for long. She zipped through her Bachelor of Arts in just two years, returning home to accept a marriage proposal and a life of 65 years full of love, adventure, laughter, and just the right amount of chaos.

Anne and Bud married on December 11, 1948, and started their journey as a family—with Anne working at the telephone company to help support Bud through his university studies. Together they raised five children: Carolyn, David, Shane, Peggy, and Trinda, and crisscrossed more zip codes than most people change socks. Their life took them from the wilds of Alaska—where Anne proved herself a real-life pioneer, hunting game, canning meat, and giving birth in a first aid station—to the comfort of Lynnwood and Lacey, eventually returning to their beloved Lummi Island.

A woman of many hats (and probably sewed most of them herself), Anne was a librarian by trade and a creator by nature. She retired as Assistant Librarian from Western Washington University but never truly stopped cataloging the world in her own beautiful way—through stories, art, and love. Her hand-braided wool rugs warm homes across the country. Her sketches of island life, her legendary pies, her intricately sewed clothes, and her years of dedicated service to the Lummi Island Grange and Mermaids are still the stuff of local lore.

Anne did not just join the Grange... she participated fully. She wrote plays, directed, acted, and created costumes for Pomona contests. And when the Grange won too many awards (thanks to her), the contests were simply discontinued...because really, who could compete with Anne? For 30 years, she helmed the Grange Fair booth, with a focus on the uniqueness of Lummi Island Grange. She was the former Master of the Grange and the heart of every gathering.

Anne loved being a Lummi Island Mermaid and shared her sense of humor, creativity and loyal friendship with her Mermaids, for over 30 years. The Mermaid parade float and our Island Lighted Vehicle Tour came about through her spirited creativity.

She and Bud saw the world, including every state in the U.S., the Arctic, the southern tip of Mexico, and the Amazon River, Asia, Europe and Russia. After Bud's passing in 2017, Anne kept the wheels rolling—traveling with her daughters, carrying on the legacy of adventure (and probably giving airline staff something to talk about). She was a daughter, sister, aunt, librarian, artist, seamstress, baker, gardener, and fiercely loyal friend. She was the kind of woman who could patch a pair of overalls, quote Dickens, bake a pie, out-hike you, paint a seascape, and still have energy left to beat you at cards. She leaves us with a well-organized book collection, countless hilarious stories, and a model of what it means to live life with grit, grace, and an irrepressible sparkle.

Anne leaves behind a loving, laughter-filled legacy that includes:

If you have not already noticed, we now have a new Community Calendar system on OurLummilsland.org! The old one was causing issues and adding features we don't need as they increased the price. So, we had to spend many months of finding new systems, loading them in, trying them out, and ultimately deleting them. Then we found this one which is Free (we are thrifty), offers some new things we really wanted, and is very straightforward. That said, there are always little peculiarities and such to learn with a new system. But it's up and available for your organization's events.

Note the list of categories, we really like this, and it will always show "All Categories" at first, but you can click on a specific one to immediately only see it's listings. It also offers an easy way to jump forward to other months for planning. However, unlike the old system, we (the Publications Team) will have to enter the events. At the top of the calendar is a Link to a form to submit your event. Even if just in the planning stages, once you have a date, send us the information you have with a "Details to Follow" in the description. That way you can let others know you have an event as they plan theirs.

#### Some other things of note:

- · When submitting articles for the TOME, please do not send us any watermarked or copyrighted images. Most you just "find on the internet" are actually copyrighted. If you wish to have a free image that is safe to use, we suggest you use Pixabay.com which has thousands of truly free images with a real right to use Royalty Free License. Why do we say this, many copyright holders will come after you (and us) with large fines and fees. Best to do it the right way.
- If your TOME article is repetitious every month, we will ask you to submit it Quarterly instead. We can also discuss other options to keep folks aware of your organization and services.
- If you want to keep up to date on what the Publications schedule and things we are doing, go to MC.LICA.us there you can sign up for the eTome, Brown Betty, and our once a month Publications Update email.


